Clarkston Moves Forward with New City Hall

A New Home for Government Services Brings Expanded Access, Improved Efficiency, and Space to Grow



The City of Clarkston is entering a new chapter in municipal service with the relocation of its administrative offices, municipal court, and police headquarters to a new, 27,510-square-foot facility located at **736 Park North Boulevard**, **Suite 120, Clarkston, GA 30021**.

Beginning July 7, 2025, the new building will be open to the public, providing improved access, modern infrastructure, and a more unified approach to service delivery.

The relocation, unanimously supported by Mayor Beverly H. Burks and the Clarkston City Council, consolidates key city services currently housed at multiple locations, including City Hall at **3921 Church Street** and City Hall Annex at **1055 Rowland Street**. This move reflects the city's ongoing commitment to operational efficiency, public safety, and the long-term needs of its growing workforce.

"This is a strategic investment in the City of Clarkston's future," said Mayor Beverly H. Burks. "It reflects our commitment to building a local government that meets the needs of our residents today while preparing for the growth and opportunities of tomorrow. With this move, we're creating a more connected, efficient, and welcoming space for everyone who lives, works, and visits our city."

The new headquarters features expanded office space to support current staff and future recruitment, upgraded security for municipal operations and court services, and dedicated areas for community engagement and collaboration. Enhanced infrastructure and updated technology will allow for more responsive, streamlined interactions between residents and city departments.

City Manager ChaQuias Miller-Thornton emphasized the importance of this move in shaping Clarkston's future. "This facility is designed with our growing

staff in mind, offering a dynamic environment that promotes collaboration, innovation, and a strong sense of community. We are moving forward together to build a brighter future for our city."

As city operations transition to the new facility throughout this month, officials are working to ensure a seamless shift with minimal disruption to public services. Throughout the month of July, all scheduled court proceedings and public meetings will continue to be held at the current City Hall, located at **3921 Church Street**.

90 Days In: A Conversation with City Manager ChaQuias Miller-Thornton

Reflecting on her First Three Months, Clarkston's New City Manager Shares Her Vision, Values, and Commitment to Community-Driven Progress



The City of Clarkston is entering a new phase of leadership under City Manager ChaQuias Miller-Thornton. With her first 90 days now behind her, Miller-Thornton reflects on her early experiences, priorities, and the vision she brings to the role. Her leadership has already left a meaningful impression, marked by collaboration, transparency, and a deep commitment to both operational excellence and community connection.

From the beginning, Miller-Thornton sensed something special about Clarkston. She described her initial impressions as grounded in acceptance and promise. Residents, staff, and community partners welcomed her with optimism and a genuine eagerness for consistent, strategic leadership. "What stood out right away was the potential," she said. "The city already has well-established departments that are equipped to meet the needs of our community. That is not something many small cities can say."



Her first few months have been full of analysis, engagement, and action. Miller-Thornton approached her role with purpose, starting with one-on-one meetings with department heads and council members, a review of city planning documents, and a deep dive into the city's operational systems.

Key moments in her first 90 days include hosting a strategic staff and council retreat, supporting the successful execution of Clarkston's first Housing Summit in partnership with the Atlanta Regional Commission, and leading the relocation of City Hall operations to 736 Park North Boulevard.

Throughout this process, her top priorities have been to evaluate the city's financial standing following turnover in the finance department and to assess the organizational culture. Her goal is to create an environment where policies and procedures reflect both accountability and collaboration.

Clarkston Adopts 2025 Millage Rate After Public Review

Following Three Public Hearings and a Financial Presentation by City Leadership, the New Rate of 15.80 Mills Will Support Essential Services and City Operations



On June 26, 2025, the Clarkston City Council adopted the 2025 millage rate, setting it at 15.80 mills. The decision followed a series of three public hearings and was based on an initial presentation from the City Manager and Finance Department. This presentation reflected a thorough review of the city's financial outlook and property tax collection rates.

The approved ordinance establishes real property ad valorem tax assessments for the upcoming year, along with applicable reductions and exemptions. The millage rate provides the foundation for continued investment in essential city services, including public safety, infrastructure, sanitation, and community initiatives.

We extend our sincere thanks to the residents who participated in the process. Your feedback and engagement helped shape this important decision and continue to guide the city in serving the best interests of the Clarkston community.

June Business of the Month: CrossFit Liminal

Redefining Fitness Through Equity, Grit, and Grace

On the edge of Clarkston, just off the hum of I-285, sits a gym that doesn't look —or feel—like your typical fitness space. There are weights, yes. There are workouts, sweat, and early mornings. But there's also something more: laughter, high fives, community potlucks, and stories of transformation that reach far beyond physical fitness.

This is CrossFit Liminal, a nonprofit gym founded by Nick Johnson in 2020, born not out of business ambition but a deeper desire to create a space where strength was accessible to everyone, no matter their background, income, or starting point.

The idea first took shape in a garage. Nick had been experimenting with a different kind of gym model—one rooted in community, equity, and care. He wanted to see if a place like Clarkston, known for its vibrant diversity and global roots, would respond to something less traditional and more human-centered. "Spoiler alert: it did," Nick says with a grin.



Then the pandemic hit. That garage gym became a temporary home for a handful of committed members. But the mission didn't stop—it just got stronger.

By 2022, CrossFit Liminal had grown into a real space, a physical home tucked into a corner of the city where people from all walks of life could show up and discover what they were capable of. At the time of opening, they had 25 members. Today, that number is around 125. But for the Liminal team, the growth isn't just measured in numbers—it's in stories, relationships, and quiet victories.
