Surviving an Active Shooter, Threat Event

ctive Shooter events have increased in the past years and have become deadlier. The five most deadly Active Shooter events in the United States have occurred since 2007, and are as follows:

- Las Vegas, NV country music festival on 10/01/2017 58 killed
- Orlando, FL Pulse Night Club on 06/12/2016 49 killed
- Blacksburg, VA Virginia Tech on 04/16/2007 32 killed
- Newtown, CT Sandy Hook Elementary on 12/14/2012 27 killed
- Sutherland Springs, TX Sutherland Springs Church on 11/05/2017 – 26 killed

With recent, relative to the publishing of this edition of "Connections" newsletter, shootings including Parkland, FL, Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School where 17 people were killed.

In looking at the above list of the deadliest Active Shooter events, note where they occurred; an outdoor music festival, a night club, a church, a college campus, and an elementary and high school. There have been Active Shooter events, not listed above, in malls, shipping distribution centers, work places and military recruitment centers to name a few. In other words, these types of shootings can occur anywhere and at any time of the day.

What can you expect and what can you do if you find yourself in one of these events?

AVOID, DENY, DEFEND

First, you must understand what your body will experience and how that may affect your chances of survival ability. In any stressful event your body will naturally increase your heart rate which will cause increased breathing. This could, if not controlled, cause hyperventilation.

Knowing how to control your breathing, and breaking tunnel vision, will increase your ability to get out of the situation.

Second, you need to avoid the area and get out of the area if possible. Knowing your escape routes and your surroundings is key to this step.

Third, if you find yourself in a situation and are unable to avoid the area, you need to find an area to deny entry to the suspect.

Finally, if you are unable to avoid the area and you have found an area where you can deny entry to the suspect, you must prepare to defend yourself. Just because you don't have a weapon does not mean it's over.

Chronology of the New American Celebration

arch 15, 2018, started early, very early for New American Celebration participants and attendees. After being picked up in Clarkston, at the Community Center, by a Coalition of Refugees Service Agencies (CRSA) van, the journey to the Catholic Shrine of the Immaculate Conception began.

Upon arrival to the Catholic Shrine, attendees were asked to checkin, and to grab a number, that was explained during the program, from a basket on the check-in table. During check-in, time was allotted for networking with participants and attendees before the Kick-off Event, program, begins.

The Kick-off Event started with a welcome and introduction to CRSA by Emily Laney, CRSA Chair. Speakers and presenters on the program included Iman SH Salahadin Wazir, State Rep. Bee Nguyen, Stephanie Jackson Ali and Mustafa Alsaeedi, a refugee, Georgia State University (GSU) student, and Operations Specialist at Friends of Refugees.

At the end of the program, attendees were asked to form groups according to the number they selected at check-in. As soon as all members joined the groups, their team leader provided instructions to execute the distribution of CRSA materials to legislative offices in the Coverdell Office Building and Georgia State Capitol. Each group was assigned specific State Representatives to drop off CRSA materials.

Tagging along with Group #12, led by Nicholas Barker, Case Manager, Lutheran Services, they left the

Catholic Shrine of the Immaculate Conception to walk to the State Capitol. Before being escorted to the State Capitol, each team member was required to go through security check points and screenings.

Having successfully passed security measures, and upon entering the Capitol, groups dispersed to take elevators to their respective assigned legislators offices to drop off the CRSA materials. Group #12 assigned legislators included Rep. Sheila Clark Nelson, Rep. Bill McGowan and Rep. Renitta Shannon. As expected, because the House was in session, none of the assigned legislators were in their office.

Next, all of the groups got back together to take a massive group shot on the staircase in the atrium of the Capitol. Every square foot of the staircase and breezeway was occupied with New American Celebration, an estimated 200 - 300, attendees and participants.

With group shots taken from as many angles as possible, groups reformed to do action filled-Legislative Outreach. Using the Page System, group leaders requested, via a form delivered by a Page, that legislators step outside of their chambers to come and speak with CRSA representatives comprised of New American Celebration participants and attendees.

Group #12 was successful in getting to speak with all three of the legislators that were requested to meet with them. During these informal and impromptu outreach discussions, CRSA representatives attempted to garner support for their advocacy on behalf of refugees and immigrants, now known as New Americans.

Detours and Traffic Shifts Planned for DeKalb Watershed Management Water Main Installation Project

he DeKalb County Department of Watershed Management (DWM) urges motorists to use caution when driving on East Ponce de Leon Avenue between I-285 and Market Street as work begins on the final phase of the Clarkston Streetscape Water Main Relocation Project.

Under construction since August 2017, the Clarkston Streetscape Water Main project is designed to improve water and fire service to the City of Clarkston by replacing nearly 8,000 linear feet of existing water mains that have reached or exceeded their average useful service lives. As part of the project, new ductile iron pipe, water meters, hydrants, backflow preventer devices and service lines to the new mains are being installed along portions of East Ponce de Leon Avenue, Market Street, Rowland Street and Norman Road.

DWM reports that project contractor Layne Inliner, Inc., has installed more than 3,000 feet of water pipe and completed service tie-ins on Norman Road, Rowland Street and Market Street. Though delayed due to unforeseen permitting issues, the most impactful water main installation on East Ponce de Leon Avenue is now underway. Expect an increase in heavy equipment traffic on East Ponce de Leon Avenue between Interstate 285 and Market Street. In addition, there will be temporary one-lane closures along the project route, which may cause traffic delays. Traffic safety and control measures are in effect to assist drivers in moving safely and orderly through the construction zone. Detours and police direction also will be implemented in April and June when work reaches the Mell Avenue and North Indian Creek Drive intersections.

Drivers are urged to observe lane restrictions and pay close attention to "caution" signs and traffic control personnel during construction hours. Clarkston residents directly impacted by lane closures or restricted driveway access associated with the work will be notified by letter, door hanger or personal visit at least 72 hours in advance.

Normal work hours are from 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. on weekdays, excluding major holidays. However, in some instances, there may be night, weekend or expanded weekday hours associated with this project. Originally scheduled for completion at the end of April 2018, the construction is now expected to last through August 2018, with work on the City of Clarkston's Streetscape project to continue beyond that date.

Specific inspections done by Hines to enforce Stormwater compliance by business owners and operators include, but are not limited to, inspections of grease traps and other FOG (Fats/Oils/Grease) codes, construction sites to make sure that building debris, sediments aren't being put into drainage pipes, that there is proper run-off, if any, that in-code fencing is up around and installed on construction sites, to make sure that dirt and rocks being removed from construction sites, are not left in the streets in Clarkston.

All inspections are done to prevent harmful waste from entering water pipes and drains that go into waterways impacting the quality and quantity of drinking water.
